





### **How Many Students Attended?**

A total of 103 students participated in at least 1 hour of program this year. All students met the state threshold to count as participants (15+ hours). This is over 68% of the target number of 150. Starting in Year Two, the program needs to serve at least 95% of the target to avoid a budget penalty.




Percent of target number of students who attended 15+ hours of programming








Percentage of students who scored a 1 or 2 on the previous year's MATH exam and improved their score on the current year's exam.





Among the 20 students with a teacher survey who could possibly improve, 60% (12) improved their engagement in school.

Among the 4 students with ODRS in 2122, 3 (75%) reduced the number in 2223. However, this sample size is too low to be valid.





• Many performance indicators were met, and surveys showed that parents and students were happy with the program and the opportunities it afforded.



• NWBCC and the site coordinator have operated programming at this site for many years, which allowed the program to run essentially uninterrupted as the new grant cycle began.



• The smaller size of the school and the proximity to the Community Center allows staff to have a deep understanding of the students and their needs.
